- Not only do I help with students, I also help the nurse out with paper work if any needs to be done.
- Within my time there the average number of students served daily in that 2 hour span was 15.





What I really learned

- Not only did I learn how to take care of kids from different ages from 5 to 14 year olds, I also learned how to interact with them in different ways!
- The children from the elementary school like to be informed of things, it's the age where they learn everything, their brains are like sponges. That's why it's important to tell them the right answer when they ask you about something, instead of making up something silly "just because they're a kid so they wont understand anyway". They also like to be praised, this keeps them motivated from a young age!
- The kids from the middle school are a little bit different. Though some still ask questions, it's more about them just talking, and it's good to listen to them. This is the age group that may feel awkward or think they don't have anyone to speak with. That's why it's nice to lend an ear and laugh with them, make them feel comfortable with themselves and the staff around them.
